Here is your "One Thing" for this week: How does Jesus' statement that He came "to seek and to save the lost" serve as an encouragement to you to be involved in evangelism and discipleship? Pray that God would give you an opportunity to share the Gospel during this Easter season!

I. EQUIP — Compare and contrast "The Blind Beggar" and "The Wee Taxman." Then, read Luke 18.18–27. How does "The Rich Young Ruler" compare and contrast with The Blind Beggar (Luke 18.35–43) and The Wee Taxman (Luke 19.1–10)? How does these true stories contribute to Luke's Gospel?

II. ENGAGE — Both "The Blind Beggar" and "The Wee Taxman" represent people who were "outsiders" in the first-century Jewish culture (see 18.39; 19.7). Who are people we tend to view as "outsiders" in today's Christian culture?

III. EXALT — How does Jesus' "Seeking, Seeing, and Saving" of The Blind Man and The Wee Taxman demonstrate His love, grace, and mercy (see Luke 19.10). How does this insight lead you to worship Him today?
